Sociology 513 – Urbanization and Community

This course will explore a number of current theories, perspectives and empirical research about contemporary American cities. We will touch only briefly but importantly where needed on comparative and historical cities in other places and times. There are two foci for the course: the first is on the political economy of cities and what some have called the new urban paradigm; and the second is on the concept of community and its fate in contemporary society. Each class meeting I will lecture for the first period. Second, we will then engage in discussion of the readings and you will submit a 1 page synopsis and questions based on readings for that day. Third, we will have outside book/article reports and discussion. Each of you will select and present three book/article reports during the quarter based on additional books/articles selected in consultation with me. This will include a 3 page write-up with sufficient copies for the class for discussion, and a 2 page critical review and assessment for me. Each of you will do a final term paper (approximately 10 pages) on a topic selected in consultation with me. You will share the results of your research paper with the class during the final class period.
