Synopsis

The best way to learn field methods is to conduct field research. Each of you will embark on a small project that will allow you to practice collecting data, analyzing data, and writing it up. Along the way you will learn about the complex challenges and rewarding experience of conducting qualitative research.

Learning Objectives

- Recognize when field methods are most appropriate.
- Develop skills of field methods data collection: observing, note-taking, listening, probing, and writing field notes.
- Develop skills for qualitative data analysis: interpreting, coding, and synthesizing.

- Develop skills of qualitative data presentation: selecting and editing data.
- Evaluate the rigor of field methods.
